Funding contacts to get you started

Projects to benefit the wider community, including church building improvements

If you are applying for urgent repairs funding under the HLF Grants for Places of Worship (GPoW) programme, up to 15% of the total grant can be spent on improvements such as **loos and kitchens** but it has to fund a whole loo or kitchen – not just part of it! In other words, other funding should not be involved in this particular part of your bid.

If you are not applying to the HLF's Grants for Places of Worship and need sources of funding for improvements, you could start by trying the following:

Allchurches Trust (owners of Ecclesiastical Insurance) welcomes applications from less well-off parishes and projects which benefit the Christian mission and helps local communities. Grants will be considered in response to appeals from churches for building and restoration projects, repair of church fabric, church community initiatives, religious charities, charities preserving the UK heritage and other charitable causes. <http://www.allchurches.co.uk/index.aspx>

Awards for All is the small grants programme of the **Big Lottery**– £300–10,000. Most of the Big Lottery funding goes to projects applying through open, responsive programmes such as **Awards for All** and **Reaching**

Communities. Over 90% of Big Lottery grants in 2014–15 had a value of less than £10,000. Check out the website for the latest information, including eligibility and exclusions.

Bernard Sunley Charitable Foundation can help registered charities with capital projects such as new build, refurbishment, equipment or transport. Community, education and arts projects are among those considered. <http://www.bernardsunley.org> *Please note: They support church halls, but not churches or other buildings intended purely for religious purposes.*

Cinnamon Network supports church community projects across the UK offers micro grants for churches to start a community project. Churches in England can apply for £1,500. The grant amount has to be matched by £3,000 and this can come from cash, gifts in kind, premises, professional pro-bono services, asset items and salaries.

There is no deadline and the application process is ongoing.

National Churches Trust. One of their four programmes is Community Grants – which offers grants of £5,000 and above for facilities that will enable increased community use of places of worship. Projects to benefit the wider community continued

Suffolk Community Foundation manages a variety of charitable funds and can award grants to charitable organisations or community groups that help relieve disadvantage and deprivation across Suffolk and make a real difference to people's lives. Will not support promotion of religious or political causes. <http://suffolkcf.org.uk>

Suffolk Historic Churches Trust: The trust supports the provision of modern facilities in churches where they do not already exist small grants may be made towards toilet and kitchen projects. Grants up to £10,000. <http://www.shct.org.uk/grants>

Waste Recycling Environmental (WREN) Heritage Fund: Are you within 10 miles of a licensed landfill site? You may be eligible for a grant for your community building. WREN has recently changed how it funds community projects with a single programme called the FCC Community Action Fund. Repair projects

Government roof fund

Any listed place of worship in the UK that meets the criteria of urgent need – as stated by your existing Quinquennial Inspection report. Grants between £10,000---100,000. This can cover the full cost of your project, excluding VAT. If your project is above this value, you can contribute your own funds. VAT can be recovered through the Listed Place of Worship Grant Scheme --- <http://www.lpwscheme.org.uk>

HLF Grants for Places of Worship – Urgent structural repair for listed places of worship. You must be prepared to deliver the vital outcome of 'more people and a wider range of people will have engaged with heritage'.

Partnership Grants – The NCT works in partnership with 26 local charities to provide grants towards repair projects. Grants from £2,500 to £10,000 for urgent repair projects and you apply

to the **Suffolk Historic Churches Trust (SHCT)**. The SHCT may grant funds towards the cost of preservation, repair, maintenance, and improvement of churches and chapels within Suffolk. Grants up to £10,000. *The Trust can also offer practical help to PCCs with seeking other sources of funding.* <http://www.shct.org.uk/grants>
