

1. STUDY



We commend to you the Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent book "Saying Yes to Life", a delightful and thought-provoking exploration of the biblical story of creation in which God himself said "Yes" to life. It can be read on its own or as part of a discussion group over six sessions. Extra resources will be available online including a study guide, extra questions, a youth group resource and video content. As an alternative there will also be a simplified Lent course following the same themes available to download from the Diocesan website (coming soon). 2. BE CHALLENGED

Wed 26 Feb	It's Ash Wednesday. With Christian Aid's help, women in Ethiopia are making and selling stoves that burn less wood. Use less power by using a steamer or only boiling the amount of water you need.	***
Thurs 27	Women in Africa often make soap as an extra source of income . Swap your single-use plastic bottle of shower gel for a bar of soap.	***
Fri 28	Preparing for the weekend shop? Find your nearest shop that sells refills and loose goods you can store in jars and shop there instead. You won't have to throw all that packaging away!	***
Sat 29	Climate change is seriously affecting people in developing countries. Campaigning makes a difference. Is there a climate march or strike near you during Lent that you can join?	***
Sun 1 Mar	Micah 6:8 'do justice, love kindness and walk humbly with your God.' Fairtrade products do less damage to the environment. Are you a Fairtrade church? Could you become one?	***
Mon 2	Yes it's Monday morning - back to work. But you could feel better if you were doing your bit by sharing a lift to work or cycling and taking one more car off the road!	***
Tues 3	Trees soak up carbon dioxide. Change your search engine to Ecosia and let your searches plant trees around the world www.ecosia.org/	***

Many people told us that they enjoyed last year's 'Kagera Challenge' over the 40 days of Lent, so this year we have made an 'Environmental Challenge' along similar lines. The Bishops' Environment Fund

The Bishops propose to start a new seed fund for environmental initiatives across our diocese – providing small grants of up to £250 to be administered by the Diocesan Environment Group. Your gifts to this fund will enable us to offer small grants to parishes for projects focusing on our mission to care for God's creation. A giving leaflet is enclosed should you wish to support this scheme either as individuals or churches. Information on how to apply for grants will be shared later in the year.



A Rocha UK is the Christian environmental charity behind the Eco Church Scheme. They are committed to keeping the scheme free to join, but clearly it is not free to run. They need our support to continue this vital work, as well as their

other initiatives in creating nature reserves such as Foxearth Meadow, near Sudbury, an important site for dragonfly conservation and well worth a visit.
