

Welcome

The Gospel invites us to celebrate the good news of God's saving love.
That's what lies behind our shared diocesan vision for Growing in God: God wants us to grow as his beloved children, he wants us to grow as loving communities, he wants us to grow in sharing his love beyond ourselves in both our words and actions.

Our mission statement says that we intend to become "flourishing congregations, making a difference".

to deepen our desire to respond to the call of Christ in every part of life

Growing in Influence


to reach beyond ourselves by growing our presence, engagement and service in the wider world

Growing Younger

to grow congregations and/or Fresh Expressions of church that match the age profile of the local population



"We cannot determine the fruit of growing in number or growing younger. We cannot compel people to have a faith – though we can do many simple things to make that growth possible – planting and watering – clearing the weeds and brambles – sowing seeds – not being fatalistic and believing in God's providence. But we can determine what we do in seeking to grow in depth, attending to deepening our own faith and Christian practice, and engaging in actions that helps us to grow in influence"

You are encouraged to involve everyone in the process of working on your plan. You may also want to include the Fresh Expressions of Church as they may already have growth plans. If possible, you could include a younger representative from your congregation and someone who is relatively new to the church.

A benefice with many smaller parishes may find it helpful to work together on a Benefice growth plan. This could include input from each of the parishes or each parish could make its own growth plan, which could be bought together in a Benefice growth plan reflecting the things you do together and separately.

If you completed these tasks in Growing in God Phase I, this is an opportunity to evaluate your plans from three years ago, reviewing your current situation and to refresh your plans for the next two years.


Celebrating

As a parish or benefice, you may wish to use the resources in the Appendices as part of your regular worship or to hold a dedicated Growing in God service. You will see the Growing in God process as part of your response to the generosity and hospitality of God. This is an opportunity to give thanks to God for his faithfulness at the outset and you will be building on the faithful witness of many saints over the years.

During the service you could give the Vision & Strategy leaflets and new prayer bookmarks to your congregation.

If you completed Growing in God three years ago this is a great opportunity to remind them of the previous action points and illustrate how you have since progressed since.

Use your service to celebrate all the best things you do – some of which you may take for granted. Ask your congregation to share the good things in the life of your parish or benefice based on our four priorities.



"I discussed the Growing in God mission initiative with all seven parishes and – despite an initial outlook of "we can't do anything to grow in number or younger" - we achieved growth by expanding and developing existing activities in a positive way. We started by prayerfully considering the Growing in God materials and realised that some of our activities already fitted under the Growing in God umbrella. Over time we have gained confidence in pursuing new ideas and have realised the goal to grow.

A few examples include: a tiny parish offering an Easter egg hunt developed this into an Easter garden which was supported by over 20 children and has led to more new children's activities. In another parish, their traditional 4-part choir has broadened their repertoire to attract new members. Also, two parishes have recently opened their church doors during the day, providing their communities with a space for prayer.

I would recommend perseverance with the Growing in God initiative: start small and it will gather momentum. Be prepared to do things differently and you will see areas of growth within each parish".

Reflecting

Reflection involves the discipline of "missional listening" which includes:

Listening to God

Listening to ourselves

Listening to your community

Listening to the church

Listening to those who may partner with you in your mission

Holding a reflection meeting

If you are seeking to complete this process in a single meeting, you may need to make sure that those who come along have had the opportunity to do some preparation in advance to share ideas.

You could ask participants to:

Read the local paper

Notice patterns and places where people meet

Notice how and about what people communicate

Read your parishes' extracts from the Church of England's Parish Spotlights which will give you some useful data about the population which you serve.

Consider the partners you currently work with and list those who you could work alongside in the future

Review any past actions points (particularly if you set them three years ago)

This booklet includes four useful worksheets to help you reflect on what your church is doing

Each worksheet includes:

A starter – to express what you are doing in each of the priority areas, looking at the strengths and weaknesses of your church

Statements – these ask you to think about different features of church life and what you might want to develop. The lists are not intended to be exhaustive

Actions — an opportunity to decide on one or two actions that you believe your church should carry out

Your reflection process could be completed in a single two-hour meeting or conducted over a series of smaller meetings each covering a different priority.

Planning

Having completed the Celebrating and Reflecting stages you should have enough information to be able to discuss what it might take to develop these actions. Methods to help you generate a discussion ▼

Passionate about

(what really matters to us?)

Partnership with

(who else? where else?)

Gifted in

(what we're good at and enjoy)

In six months time

In the planning stage, the maximum of eight actions (two from each priority area) will be prayerfully reduced to three. One of these should be something you can readily achieve within six months, leaving two more substantial actions that will require more significant time and resources

You could hold an open evening for your congregation and electoral roll members to look at the actions you are proposing:

Start with a short act of worship

Explain the aim of the evening – to identify three ways in which your church can be Growing in God over the next two years

Present the findings of your reflection meeting(s), with up to eight suggestions, two for each of our priorities

Display the suggestions on large pieces of card or flip-chart paper around the room



Discuss these in four small groups, each discussing a different priority and then ask someone from each group to feed back its main points to the whole meeting.

Give everyone three post-it notes. Ask each person to choose which suggestions they believe it is appropriate for your church to develop, each person should choose one suggestion that could be started within six months. If they wish to be involved in one or more of the suggestions, they should write their name on the post-it.

Keep a record of the meeting:

- a photograph of flip chart sheets
- copies of the post-it notes
- notes from the small group discussions

Summarise the results to the whole meeting and draw some conclusions.

Use the evidence to establish:

- What do they feel passionate about, and why?
- What do they feel your church is gifted with?
- Identify possible people or partners to work with from other churches or the wider community, to engage in the suggested areas of growth
- Agree three goals that can be achieved in six months





Remember: your Archdeacon would love to hear you talk about your plans if you have a pastoral visitation.

Next Steps:

Agree your three key goals
Authorise those who will undertake them
Allocate resources
Clarify what you may need to stop doing, to enable these actions to take place
Note any training needs
Communicate your findings to the wider congregation
Use this planning booklet to prepare and engage in the Deanery Planning Process during 2019

Appendix 2 | Discerning prayer

You may find it helpful to use one or more approach from each section in a time of prayer. Prepare beforehand so that you have what you need, e.g. candle, music, Bibles, newspapers, a 'prayer tree' and 'leaves', or cards and a bowl etc.

In a group, welcome everyone. Explain how the thoughts and insights from your prayers will fit into the Growing in God reflection process.

Arrive in the present

- Take a deep breath ... maybe several deep breaths ...
- Light a candle as a sign that you are in God's presence.
- · Prepare in informal or formal words: e.g.
 - O God, make speed to save us;
 - O Lord, make haste to help us.
 - Lead your people to freedom, O God
 - And banish all darkness from our hearts and minds.
- Play or sing a song or hymn.
- Attend to one another, e.g. briefly share with a neighbour a moment from your day.

Reflect

• With **Scripture**: e.g. John 15.1-11; Mark 4:26-32; 1 Corinthians 3.5-9

You may like to read a passage through slowly. If any word or phrase stands out for you, sit with it for as long as it speaks to you.

Or you may like to explore the text itself, reading its context and looking up crossreferences.

On life in our parish / benefice / deanery

Use local newspapers to remind you of life locally. Looking at a particular story, how do you feel? What do you think? What would you like to do?

Or reflect on the parish spotlight summary. What stands out for you? How do you feel? What would you like to do?

In silence

Quietly sit or kneel in God's presence.

Respond

- Hold on to what you thought / felt / understood in the reflection time. In response to that, what is God's call to me, and to us?
- Share whatever you are willing to perhaps a verse, or thought, or picture, or plan. You may want to write or draw on paper leaves and fix them onto a prayer tree (a tree shape or a small branch); or write or draw on cards and put them in a bowl or box. In a small group, you may also want to share your thoughts aloud.

Offer

• Offer yourselves and your efforts in thanksgiving and prayer – in formal or informal words, in song and / or in silence.

Appendix 3 | Biblical resources

Growing in God God's Kingdom in the world

Read Mark 4:26-32 and
Luke 13:20-21

As you read these passages, what do you notice?
What stands out for you? What questions arise?
What do these pictures say to you about how God's kingdom grows and spreads? What do they say about your role – as individuals and as a church group – in this process?

The context around each of these verses is one of controversy – in the preceding days Jesus has been criticised for healing on the Sabbath and has challenged people's perceptions of him and the kingdom in his provocative teachings. How does this understanding of context shape the way you understand these three images of the kingdom?

In what ways can you watch out for signs of the kingdom

The Kingdom of God

growing? What signs would you be looking for?
Based on these three images, of the growing seed, the mustard seed and the yeast, how might you be different in the coming month in your approach to growing God's kingdom?

The gospels make it clear that Jesus came with a specific mission: to bring in God's kingdom (Mark 1:15, Matthew 4:17), known by Mark and Luke as the 'Kingdom of God' and by Matthew as the 'Kingdom of heaven'. This term isn't meant to refer to a geographical place, but to a way of being in which God rules and life is lived accordingly. The kingdom will not be fully realised until Jesus returns - until that point there is still struggle between God's kingdom and other ways of being - but Jesus' teaching, both verbal (in his stories and discourses) and practical (in his miracles and behaviour) gives tasters of what this kingdom looks like.

- ➤ John's Gospel has Jesus speaking of having come "that they may have life, and have it to the full" (John 10:10). How do you understand life in all its fullness?
- > What might it mean in practice for the kingdom to be both 'now' and 'not yet'?

Reading Jesus' Parables

Much of Jesus' teaching was delivered in parables – stories intended to produce a response in the hearers by speaking to them in ways they would understand, and challenging them. Stories were, and are, a commonly used teaching technique, not unique to Jesus. But whereas some were set in a fantasy world, Jesus' parables were set in the known world, drawing the readers in by their familiarity. Sometimes the meaning of the parables is obvious; on other occasions they are intriguing, even mystifying, and they invite further reflection. Some parables would have shocked their original hearers (for example, the Good Samaritan).

> Why are stories such a useful teaching technique? In what ways might it be useful to 'rewrite' the parables for today?

The kingdom parables give images of what God's kingdom looks like now and how it will be in the future, its importance and impact, how it grows and how it challenges people. See, for example: Matthew 9:16-17; Luke 7:41-43; Mark 12:1-11.

> What images of the kingdom are presented in each of these parables?

Picturing the Kingdom

These readings contain three pictures of the kingdom, likening it to a growing seed, a mustard seed and yeast. There are many other parables which provide different, but complementary, depictions.

- Consider each of these pictures:
 - the weeds among good plants (Mt 13:24-30)
 - the hidden treasure (Mt 13:44)
 - the valuable pearl (Mt 13:45-46)
 - the fishing net (Mt 13:47-50)
 - the unmerciful servant (Mt 18:21-35)
 - the workers in the vineyard (Mt 20:1-16)
 - the wedding banquet (Mt 22:2-14)
 - the wise and foolish virgins (Mt 25:1-13)

What do these images tell you about the characteristics of the kingdom – what it looks like, how it grows, its value, its boundaries...?

How might the messages of these pictures be translated into images that make sense in today's world?

Further teaching on the Kingdom

As well as the parables, the gospels include a wide range of "tasters" of the kingdom, through examples and stories:

- Luke 4:31-37 authority over evil spirits
- Mark 4:35-41 authority over nature
- Matthew 15:21-28 the importance of faith
- Mark 9:14-29 the importance of
- Matthew 5:43-48 radical teaching
- How does each of these examples develop your understanding of what the Kingdom of God is like?
- What examples could you give of the kingdom breaking in to today's world?
- ➤ In what ways do your answers to these questions encourage, challenge or inspire you?
