From webinar to congregation member



St Mary's Church in Haverhill has thrived since the closure of places of worship due to Covid-19 after moving all its services online. The church made use of social media platforms to stream a range of online services and in doing so, have been able to reach a new audience.

As well as traditional church services, the highly popular Café Church session was moved online and allowed members of the community to come together at a time where many people have suffered with loneliness.

Charlotte Kalinsky, who has lived in Haverhill for her whole life, but has become a fully fledged member of the congregation

after seeing the Café Church online service via social media. Charlotte said: "I am a frontline healthcare worker, and the past year has been incredibly tough but connecting with members of my community via the online church services has been a lifeline through these extraordinary times. At a time where loneliness is rife, online church has not only provided me with an incredibly strong sense of community but lots of new friends too".

A year with Lightwave in Red Lodge

2020 was a roller coaster year for all of us - not least for the new Lightwave Rural Hub Church at Red Lodge. But Pioneer church leader Diane Grano and her growing team rose to the challenge magnificently, and their work has recently been recognised by a Lieutenant's Award.

The team quickly adapted to respond to the challenge, organising a foodbank, running a baby bank, delivering groceries and prescriptions to the particularly vulnerable, and, when possible, still running the Lightwave café and activities for children, young people and families — in person or online. The highlight of 2020 was a celebratory baptism and confirmation service led by Bishop Mike. Through the year they have really lived the Lightwave message, shining the light of Jesus in Suffolk.

The Diocesan Growing in God Growth Fund has a small amount of money to help your church reach out creatively during Lent and Easter.

Grants of up to £300 are available and any applications will be assessed on a weekly rolling basis. More details such as eligibility requirements and

The Growing in God Growth Fund encourages churches to share the Christian faith so they can grow our church family. The funds offered are to support projects that would not or are unlikely to happen without the support of this grant.

Over 2020, the fund granted £11,218, with £2,100 granted for specific Christmas projects. These grants helped churches offer Christmas boxes and goodies bags to communities, online Messy Church and New Year displays. Contact audits: As part of ensuring that the details we hold about you on our database (known as CMS) are correct (and also to ensure we remain GDPR compliant), we have been undertaking an audit of all the contacts on our database. We hold details of people who hold the following roles:

- Those who hold a Bishop's Licence or Commission.
- Parochial Church Council Members (PCCs).
- Members of the General, Diocesan and/or Deanery Synods.
- Others with recognised roles for a parish or deanery that may not already be part of any of the above groups (e.g. Deanery Organisers).

We are conducting the audit in stages and if you are in one of these groups, you will or will have already received an email asking you to check the data held for your role and we thank you for your participation.

In addition, those in the groups above can register to the CMS via this link <u>cofeportal.org</u>, and once accepted, you can view and update the data held about you.
