
Church School Ofsted results





Proposed Motion to General Synod on Church Commissioner's Funding



Motion from Tony Allwood to move that:

That this Synod: mindful of the vital role of parochial clergy in the mission of Church and the current general inadequacy of Diocesan Stipendiary Funds to meet the associated costs especially considering pressures on parish share:


- a) acknowledges that the Church Commissioners have made a remarkable turnaround since the once in a generation financial settlement of 1997 that shifted future pension liability to Diocesan Board of Finances, enabling the Church Commissioners to grow their assets from £3bn to over £10bn, while diocesan funds declined significantly
- b) endorses the ongoing financial review to bring about a more sustainable and just new settlement for the next generation; one that will ensure the Church continues to be able to afford the presence of priests in communities across the land
- c) calls for the Church Commissioners together with the Archbishops' Council to investigate how best to achieve this, including such options as the Church Commissioners
 - taking back responsibility for clergy pensions
 - funding a substantial proportion of clergy stipends
 - ringfencing or transferring £2bn £3bn in investments to Dioceses.


