On Sunday 6 March the first Recognised Local Leaders the Revd Diane Ekins-Powell and the Revd Peter Schwier, were commissioned at Fressingfield Church at a joyful service that



also celebrated the ministry of Lay Elders.

Recognised Local Leader (RLL) is a new role offered to those called to use their skills as the first point of contact for both the local community and their church family. They focus on gathering people together to grow mission and ministry enabling the local church to flourish. They work alongside the incumbent, ministry team and PCC to ensure an active, long-term

sustainable church presence in every community. The Revd Phil Dykes, Diocesan Mission Enabler, says "We aim to develop a network of Recognised Local Leaders. By being formally recognised they are both accountable and supported in their role to serve the local church".

The Revd Diane Ekins-Powell says "The response from the community has been encouraging. I visited every house in the parish, to introduce myself and then again with a gift of a candle at Candlemas. Even people who do not want to come to church or do not profess a faith, are pleased to see me and delighted with the gifts."

The Revd Peter Schwier says, "I am very excited about this ministry and believe it will grow our churches and increase our community engagement."

Taizé is a quiet and reflective service inspired by the worship of the Taizé community in France — an international, ecumenical Christian community with its own distinctive style of worship. Come along and join this special moving and reflective type of worship.

National 12 Bell Striking Contest

Saturday 26 March 2022, starting 11.00am St Edmundsbury Cathedral, Bury St Edmunds IP33 1LS

The National 12 Bell Striking Competition is an annual event which has been running since 1975. This year, St Edmundsbury Cathedral and the Suffolk Guild of Ringers will host one of three eliminator rounds at the Norman Tower in which teams will compete for the Taylor Trophy.

Seven teams of 12 ringers from across the country, from Bury St Edmunds, Leeds, Sheffield, Towcester, Ipswich, Birmingham, and The Society of Royal Cumberland Youths, will be competing to win a place in the final to be held at Guildford Cathedral in June, by impressing two judges, plus an electronic judge known as 'Hawk-Ear'. Hawk-Ear (much like Hawk-Eye in other sports) helps measure the accuracy of the ringing. Teams are judged on the timing between each bell striking, with the aim being to have consistent and equal spacing throughout the test piece while adhering to the ever-changing order in which the bells should strike. The test piece for the contest is a method known as Stedman Cinques, with each ringer required to accurately strike their bell in the right place 252 times.

Anna Chaplaincy has seen a rise in the number of people wanting to help those in the older age category. Anna Chaplains – named after the faithful widow 'Anna' who appears in Luke's gospel – are community-based. The Anna Chaplaincy network is now more than 200-strong. Anna Chaplains pursue a vocation to work in their own communities on reaching retirement-age themselves, finding renewed meaning and purpose in local
