Christians Against Poverty debt centre says "people are in quicksand" amid rising utility bills

The cost-of-living crisis is hitting families harder than ever before, says the chairman of the Suffolk Coastal debt centre. The centre launched in August 2018 with the aim of helping those in debt reach the point they will debt free in up to five years. It is one of a number of centres in Suffolk working in partnership with national charity Christians Against Poverty (CAP). The service's trained and authorised debt coaches hold private, one-to-one

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meetings with clients to understand their finances and that enable CAP nationally to contact their specific creditors to find a way to clear the debts – securing interest freezes and debt moratoria.

However, Rev Nic Stuchfield, chairman of the Suffolk Coastal Debt Centre, says it is getting increasingly difficult to help clients find a solution that balances their finances.

"Back in the beginning, I would say for around 75% of people we could find a

budget to pay off their debt without write-off in five years. Now, with the increases in utility bills, food prices and transport costs, we are finding very few of our clients are able achieve this and to come up with a budget that works. In fact, with many we find it is not possible to come up with a budget in which income exceeds expenditure even after their debt has been written off. People are in quicksand – even if their debts are written off, they still cannot break even," he said.

To combat this, the Suffolk Coastal Debt Centre is also running courses in Life Skills and Money (i.e. financial education) to give people early advice on how to manage their finances and plan for the future with the aim of stopping people getting too deeply into debt. The first eight-week CAP Life skills is now underway, with additional CAP Money sessions for adults, secondary school and primary school pupils on the way. It has also set up a Debt Centre Relief Fund for people to contribute to. This enables those who can afford it to donate their £400 energy price subsidy to Debt Centre users who cannot afford to heat their homes.

Diocesan Secretary Diary

When I became Diocesan Secretary and started visiting Anglican churches, my wife and I thought we would go to them all, ticking them off a list as we did, that was before we realised there were close to 480! I have written about some of my visits here, and I'm sure I'll do it again.

I really want to reflect here on both visiting new churches and being at home. In the last few weeks I have been back at Ipswich International Church (IIC), where I usually worship. It's great to talk to friends, feel part of the community, and have the sense of familiarity that gives. It was good to be part of the work of ministry too, teaching the kids, and preaching in another Elim church we work in partnership with. Even leading 6 am prayers was sort of a pleasure, (although the alarm at 5.30am certainly wasn't!)

This sense of community and belonging is vital to our wellbeing. We all need a place to feel at home and a place to belong.

And as I have been to a whole range of events in the diocese, from Sunday services to Synods, top-up shops to the Cathedral, Growing Leaders training to Deanery organiser meetings, I think the one thing that stands out is that feeling of community, the belonging, the sense of home. Where else can we be where we are with such a diverse range of people but still feel as one?

The more I meet with other Christians and go to other churches the more I realise that I'm actually at home in them too. That IIC is not my "home" church but that all of the church is my "home" church . We have way more in common that that which divides us, and we are one church and one people. As Paul says in Romans 12, "*in Christ, we though many, form one body".*

Suffolk Cost of Living Surviving Winter Appeal 2022

The 12th Surviving Winter Appeal this year has been widened and will now help Suffolk people, with a

three-pronged focus on 'fuel, food and support'.

With many people already facing problems due to rapid increases in the cost of living, this year the annual appeal has been extended and renamed 'Suffolk Cost of Living Surviving Winter Appeal'. Grants to help pay for fuel will be available as before, (to people of all ages), some food projects will be supported, and local charities, which are themselves facing huge challenges, could also be helped. The Appeal is a joint initiative by Suffolk Community Foundation, Citizens Advice Ipswich, and Suffolk councils' Warm Homes Healthy People.

"Across the county there are many wonderful food projects, large and small, and this year the Appeal will give grants to help some of those providing food to meet the increased demand we know they are seeing. We also want to help other smaller Suffolk charities who offer essential help and enable people to be self-sufficient, but are themselves facing challenges with stretched budgets," Melanie Craig, the Chief Executive of Suffolk Community Foundation explained. "We are very grateful for the support of the Suffolk Building Society who are a donation point for us."

In 2021/22, the Appeal raised nearly a quarter of a million pounds and provided warmth and other vital financial advice and support to over 1800 households across Suffolk.

"Our challenge now is to ensure that this year's appeal is our most successful yet. As always, we encourage people to hold on to their Winter Fuel Payment and other cost of living support if they need it to stay warm and well this winter. However, in the long held 'Don't Need it, Donate it' spirit of this appeal, we ask that those who can make a donation, *perhaps from their Government's Winter Fuel Allowance, donate it to the Appeal,"* Melanie added.

The latest local data shows the sharpest rise in fuel poverty in Suffolk that we have witnessed for some time. Despite local and national government support, it is estimated that a further 20,000 households (75,000 in total) are now struggling to meet their living costs and heat their homes as winter approaches.

Cathedral to open warm space this winter

St Edmundsbury Cathedral is opening a warm space to the public following increases in energy prices and growing inflation.

The warm space is located in the diocesan library at St Edmundsbury Cathedral and will come furnished with comfortable chairs, free tea and coffee, an opportunity to charge electronic devices and desks available for those wishing to work in a warm environment. There will also be board games and jigsaw puzzles available. It will be open to all who need it on Thursdays from 10.00 am - 3.00 pm and will be overseen by two members of cathedral staff or volunteers. The warm space will open for the first time on Thursday 3 November.

According to the End Fuel Poverty Coalition, 3.2 million households were in fuel poverty in England in 2020. Fuel poverty is determined when a household is unable to afford to heat (or cool) their home to an adequate temperature. In 2022, with the rising costs of fuel, this number is set to hit 7 million. In England a household is considered to be in fuel poverty when they are living in a property with a fuel poverty energy efficiency rating of band D or below, and once they spend the required amount to heat their home, they are left with a residual income below the official poverty line.

Cold homes can lead to a variety of health conditions and in extreme cases, death. According to the Institute of Health Equity, sickness linked to cold, damp homes cost the NHS more than £2.5 billion a year.

Revered Sarah Geileskey, Assistant Priest at the St Edmundsbury Cathedral, has been instrumental in setting up the facility. She said, "As individuals we cannot solve the cost of living crisis so it makes sense to work together and to share what we have. In becoming part of the national network, the Cathedral is sharing this particular 'warm space' into which we hope you will bring and share with others your company, your advice, your support and encouragement. A warm welcome, a cup of tea: the simplest things will make a huge difference this winter."

Royal Mail Swap Out scheme for stamps without a barcode

From January 31st 2023 ordinary 1st and 2nd Class stamps without a barcode will no longer be valid and mail will be treated in the same way as insufficient postage which means the recipient will have to pay the excess or refuse the item. Most Christmas stamps and special stamps will remain valid, but the standard 1st and 2nd Class and Large 1st and 2nd class must be used up or "swapped" via Royal Mail's Swap scheme. A special form must be obtained or downloaded and stamps attached to the sheet; then returned via Freepost SWAP OUT. You cannot swap stamps at the Post Office.
